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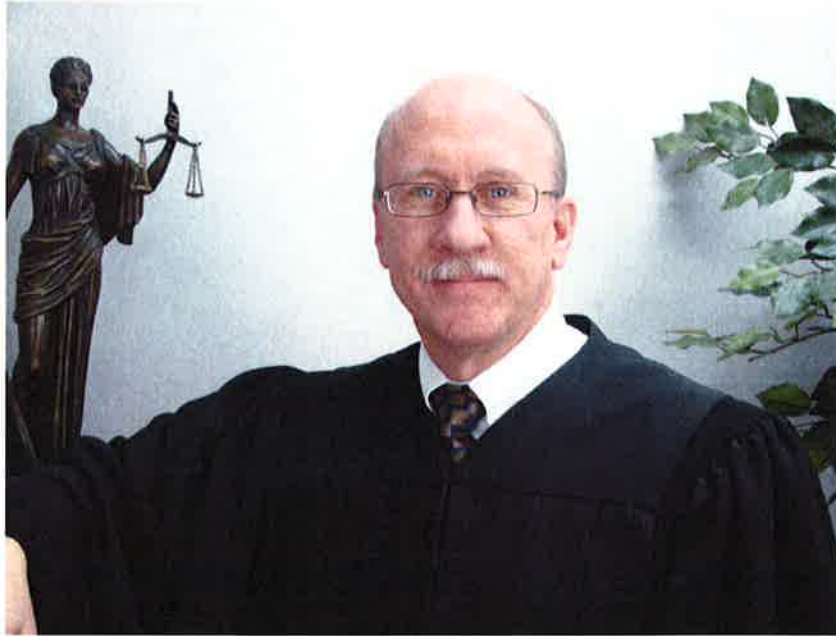

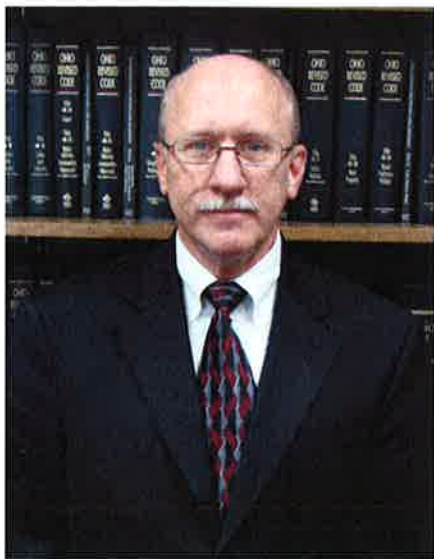

# ***PROBATE COURT***

Judge Timothy A. Williams serves as the Probate Judge for Washington County. The position is an elected, non-partisan office with a six-year term. He was first elected in February, 1997.



Judge Williams is a 1984 graduate of Ohio Northern University law school. He served as an associate editor of the Ohio Northern University Law Review. After graduation, he entered private practice from 1984 through 1997. From 1989 to 1997 he also served as the Juvenile Court Magistrate for Washington County.

As Probate Judge he hears the following types of cases: estates, guardianships, trust, adoptions, mental commitments, wrongful death, minor settlements and name changes. The Court also issues all marriage licenses for Washington County.

While most Probate Court records are open to the public, Ohio law closes records pertaining to mental illness and adoptions.

The Court maintains the following records that are open to the public during business hours:

- Estates, Guardianships, Trusts, Misc. 1789 to present
- Marriage 1789 to present
- Birth and Death 1867 to 1908

The Judge and his staff are dedicated to serving the public in a professional manner. While the staff of the Probate Court is prevented from practicing law, all efforts are made to help the public within the constraints of the law.

# *JUVENILE COURT*

Judge Timothy A. Williams as the Probate Judge also serves as the Judge of the Juvenile division for Washington County.



Mark Kerenyi serves as the full-time Magistrate for the Juvenile Court. He was appointed by Judge Williams on March 1, 2004, to help handle the caseload of the Court.

Magistrate Kerenyi is a 1990 graduate of Cleveland Marshall College of Law. He was in the private practice of law from 1996 to 1998. From 1998 to 2004 he served as an Assistant Prosecuting Attorney for Washington County prior to joining the Court.

Together, the Judge and Magistrate hear the following types of cases: abused, neglected, dependent, unruly and delinquent children, juvenile traffic offenders, custody, visitation, parentage, child support actions, and cases charging adults with failing to send children to school and contributing to the delinquency or unruliness of children.

To monitor the behavior of the children that the Judge and Magistrate place on probation, the Court has a juvenile probation staff consisting of five (5) full-time probation officers.

The Court also operates the Washington County Juvenile Center, a residential treatment and rehabilitation program for boys and girls between the ages of 12 and 18, which lasts an average of six months. The Center can accommodate 25 children in the program.

The day-to-day operation of the Court and Juvenile Center, including supervision of all employees, is managed by Court Administrator, Rae A. Ward. If you have questions or concerns about the operation of the Court or the Center, please contact Ms. Ward at (740)373-6623 Ext. 253.

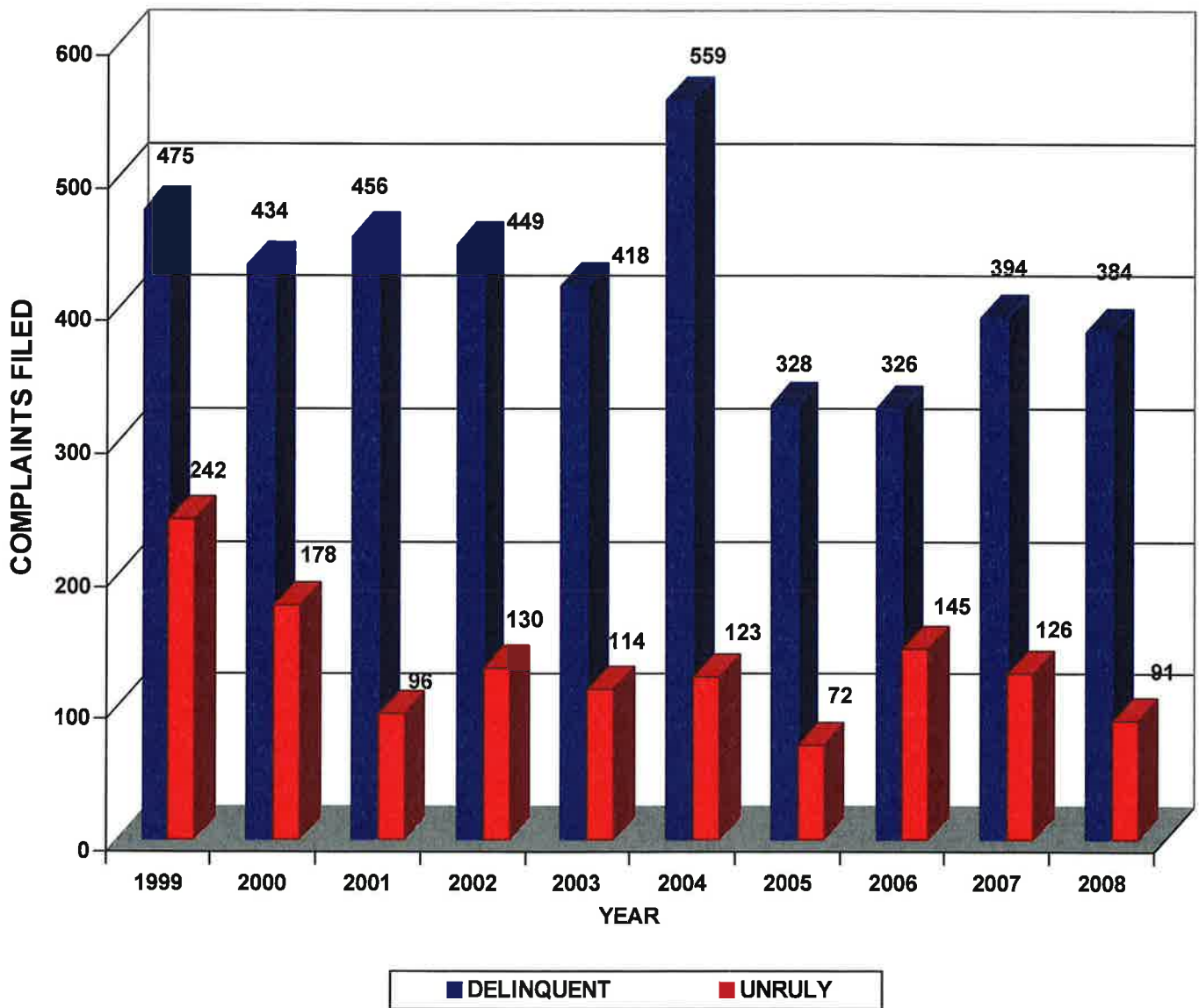

Of the above cases, 6 delinquency and 19 unruly were handled informally.

An **informal complaint** is a complaint which is handled by the Court in an informal administrative hearing by a probation officer rather than a formal court hearing. These complaints generally involve children who are coming to the Court for the first time and involve less serious offenses.

# ***PROBATION DEPARTMENT***

*Probation staff makes regular contact with the children, parents, schools, agencies and others involved with the children to assist them in making positive changes in their lives.*

The Probation department monitors youth placed under Court supervision. The department’s goal is to provide a community based corrections program with consistent sanctions geared toward altering behavior.

Probation officers see that probationers comply with Court orders by assisting the youth in accepting personal responsibility for their actions.

The Court has five probation officers. These five officers supervised a total of 296 children in 2008.

## ***COMMUNITY SERVICE***

The Community Service Program is a valuable and constructive dispositional option. The program has proven to be a positive way that juveniles can take responsibility for their actions. Youth are ordered by the Court to perform a specific number of community service work hours serving non-profit organizations in the community.

The Court monitors the progress of the children to ensure successful completion of court ordered community service hours.

In 2008, juvenile offenders provided a total of ***11,753 hours of volunteer work*** for various non-profit agencies in the community.

Based on minimum wage, the ***community received \$82,271*** in donated labor and services from these offenders.

## ***RESTITUTION PROGRAM***

The Juvenile Court Restitution Program provides a dispositional option for youth committing personal property crimes where restitution is appropriate. The program's goal is to assure that responsibility for behavior rests with the youth. It is also intended to obtain compensation for the victim.

Juvenile offenders who can make monetary restitution to their victim are ordered to pay the victim under the supervision of the probation staff.

Those youth who cannot make monetary restitution are assigned community service hours which are worked through Community Action under a grant provided by the Court in order to pay restitution. After working the number of hours required to meet restitution, a check based on minimum wage is issued to the juvenile in the amount due, which is then turned over to the victim.

In 2008, juvenile offenders were ***ordered to pay a total of \$7,722*** to their victims. ***A total of \$5,285 was collected*** and paid out for past and present restitution.

# *WASHINGTON COUNTY JUVENILE CENTER*

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## *Mission*

The Washington County Juvenile Center is operated by the Juvenile Court and serves as an alternative to state institutionalization for youth of Washington County. Youth can only be placed in the Center by the Juvenile Judge.

The Washington County Juvenile Center is one of only 17 residential rehabilitation facilities certified by the Ohio Department of Youth Services. The Center is inspected by the Department each year and meets all state requirements.

The Center can accommodate 15 boys and 10 girls in the residential rehabilitation program and 5 children in secure detention.

The Center provides children, ages 12 – 18, with three basic services: residential treatment and rehabilitation program, shelter care services and detention capabilities.

The Center's mission is to provide a safe, structured environment where delinquent youth receive help for their special needs through a very structured behavior modification program. The program emphasizes positive reinforcement and focuses on improving the child's behavior, academics, and emotional and mental well-being.

# WASHINGTON COUNTY JUVENILE CENTER

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## *Program Highlights*

- *Rehabilitation plan prepared by child and family team consisting of child, parents, probation officer, case manager, counselor, and teacher.*
- *3 case managers and 12 youth specialists work with the youth helping them achieve their rehabilitation plan.*
- *2 certified teachers and 1 teacher's aide employed through Marietta City Schools provide individualized classroom instruction on site.*
- *An on site licensed professional clinical counselor provides individual mental health counseling to the youth.*
- *A licensed counselor provides individual drug and alcohol counseling.*
- *On site mental health services provided by a licensed psychiatrist.*
- *Weekly anger management and drug and alcohol group counseling provided by Washington County Mental Health and L & P Services.*
- *Court ordered parenting program, as well as family counseling.*
- *Tutors that help youth with problem academic areas.*
- *Community Service performed daily by youth.*
- *Voluntary running club for youth where they run daily and compete in local races.*
- *Participation by youth in Walkabout Way, a 10 week Behavior Management Outdoor Adventure program.*
- *Voluntary non-denominational bible study offered.*
- *Medical, dental, and optical care provided.*
